(By the way a new release is an LP under 3 months old, an EP under 2 months old, or a single less than 1 month old.)

The Membranes have a new EP called Time Warp: 1991 The death side is what you'd probably expect, pretty grungy. The dance side has a drum machine kind of hypnotic beat. who put out one of the best records this year called You're Living All Over Me. Also at that show were The Celibate Rifles who have a new one out and will be playing at Revival on Oct 23 with The Big Thing.

The best rock-n-roll sona I've heard all week is Temporal Slut which is on the new Leaving Trains album called F\*ck. Really great album- I wish they'd play here. Tar Bables new one is cool too, also The Lemonheads from Boston and I Splt on Your Gravy from Australia.

Some New York bands that have released records are The Shaved Pigs called Breakfast is Served which is really funny, Blg Stick's Crack Attack from Buy Our Records which a trashy rap sounding song, and Sharkey's Machine Let's Be Friends on Shimmy-disc records. Pussy Galore are on Caroline now and their new one Right Now defines the word raw-I wish more bands would try to get this word into their vocabulary. Black Snakes do and their demo is great-especially Rearview Mirror.

Back home, finally finally finally The Electric Love Muffin record Play Dough Meathook is on Buy Our Records. Remember those old 'KDU carts from a year or two ago, well those songs are on it (and they sound a zillion times better than those carts) as well as some new favorites. Plus Records released Homo Picnic's Days of Grey this summer and by the time you read this the now-defunct Legitimate Reason 4-song 7" will be out. In December, the Serial Killers first LP will be out just in time for Christmas on Plus.

Philly's newest label Rave Records first project is Discoan Hands, a compilation featuring lots of Philly bands. One side I consider to be the "faster" side, more thrashy than the other side, contains cuts from the She-Males, Anthrophobia, Pagan Bables (who also are recording for Positive Force records in December),

Legitimate Reason, Homo Picnic, and Deadspot. The other side opens up with my favorite track on the record Trained Attack Dogs' -Clean Your Own House. An EP from them called Pizza will probably be out by the time you read this. Other cuts on this side are from The Balls, Das Yahoos, Tons of Nuns. Blue and McRad, A former member of McRad, Zeke Zagar, in an outfit called Eszeequeel and Bloody Blood Stone, has a record out titled Lines of Oppression.

From New Jersey, Screaming for Emily have one of the best "deep dark" records I've heard in a while. Every time ! hear it I like it more.

A compilation from San Francisco called The View From Here has a track from The Ophellas called Palindrome that will make you search out more from this band. If you like it listen to The Night of Halloween their new Also from SF are Psychotic Loudspeaker. Machine/Living with the Dead12" is available as import only on One Little Indian Records-a satanic voice singing over a dance beat with a screeching guitar running through it.

An all-girl group, Scrawl from Ohio have a good one out called Plus, also, too.

No, I'm not done yet-I didn't even start the import section. Here goes...

Well first of all how about some signings-Virgin's got That Petrol Emotion, Gave Bikers on Acid, Lime Spiders, and more that I forgot. The new Petrol Lp should be out in a little while, in the meantime their import only 12" Genius move is available. Not as upbeat poppy as Big Decision but that does not mean it's not good. I like the slow one Party Move. Revival-Nov 11-That Petrol Emotion and Salem 66. GO! Catch them now before they get real big.

Flying Nun (the label of the gods) has a UK office now, Probably one of their main reasons

for that besides the fact that New Zealand is a pretty far away place to run the best record label in the world from, is the fact that The Chills are a WANTED band, Wanted and needed by lots o' labels. Their new 12" House with 100 Rooms is soccocco nice. One year ago nobody knew or cared who The Chilis were and now they're godhead? Pretty Typical. Other Flying Nun stuff-the Bird Nest Roys and Goblinbox (sorry I haven't heard Goblinbox but a very reputable source who knows more about New Zealand than his own label recemmended them so I'd buy it on that alone).

OK The Triffids are on Island, and yes could this be true Test Department and Philip Bos and The Voodoo Club on Polydor? I don't live in England but I kinda get the feeling thats pretty maior as labels go. Upside released a live album by one of the best live acts I've ever seen, The Woodentops, called Live hypnobeat. I mean it -their records are good but live they're incredible.PVC just put out Impossible Mission by Allen Sex Fiend, It's a compilation of recent 12"s with an extra track or two I can't remember.

Pink Industry will have a new single out on Cathexis called Don't Let Go and an LP should follow. I'm eagerly awaiting Slab's new album too. The Bambl Slam 12" Happy Birthday we just got for reasons I might go into later. These Immortal Souls. which is Rowland S. Howard (of Bad Seeds/Crime & City Solution fame) and friends, have a self-titled record out and they just hooked up with a domestic label-SST! Hev. how 'bout that, Not an import but I want to mention it before I forget Aswin Batish Sitar Power is just what you'd expect. If you like that then play Eric Radam and the Bediamites too.

4AD-Another Boston band has made it to their roster-The Pixles. Expect soon The Frazier Chorus, Clan of Xymox', Peter Nooten, and Michael Brook.

The new Death in June record Brown Book features DIJ, Coll, Strawberry Switchblade and Current 93.

New Gaye Bikers On Acid out soon-supposedly its better than Everything's Groovy because I think that's pretty overrated. Gaye Bikers and The Janitors Have combined for one 12" calling themselves Big Zap and calling their record Psychadelic Shack. I love the new Three Johns Never and Always. Meanwhile Jon Langford(Mekons) has been busy producing nerw ones from The Janitors, Gave Bikers, and Sally Timms. Sally Timms collaboration with Marc Almond This House Is a House Of Trouble out a couple months ago is pretty simple but its one of those songs that you never tire of Inca Bables Opium Denis out on their own Black Lagoon label-the song Big Cyprus is one of my faves.

Rift(an American label) in conjunction with RecRec Zurich have released Tenko Slope Gradual disappearance which features Fred Frith, Arto Lindsay, David Licht, Kramer and more. Also from them is Jim Staley with people such as John Zorn, Fred Frith, Elliot Sharpe(who has a new one out on SST), among others and is titled Mumbo Jumbo.

Subway has given us new Flatmates and new Rosehlps and also Rodney Allen. They also have a new comp out-remember take Your Subway to Your suburb? Conflict(not on subway) new one Turning Rebellion into Money is not for the hardcore fan only.

Labels in the process of setting up US offices to deal with new import regulations which prevent us from keeping up to date on new imports are Play It Again Sam. Red Rhino, and Rouska, Wkdu cannot afford to buy records. We rely on promo copies. That is why The Bambi Slam is so new on KDU when in fact its been out for months. Direct service from overseas labels is sporadic. These labels do not have much of an income either and constant attention must be payed to what is happening in the industry. By setting up US offices and contacts such as Fundamental and Wax Trax and independent prompoter, labels



## biafra: 1 p.m.r.c.: 0

Several months ago WKDU sponsored a spoken word performance given by Jello Biafra. This event was a part of the on-going effort to fight censorship. This anti-censorship crusade was inspired by the charges raised against Biafra and four others by Los Angeles City Attourney, TRACEY WALBERT Michael Guarino, for distribution of harmful material to minors. I'll go insane if I have to rehash this story one more time. (For those of you who are not familiar with the story, refer to the summer communique). What I'd really like to discuss is what has happened since May's event at Drexel.

Initially, the Southern California Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union filed a demurrer on behalf of Jello and the four other defendants. In lavman terms (for those of us non-law students) this means the ACLU filed a plea which admitted to the validity of the facts, but which disputed the legal foundation upon which the charges are based. The demurrer was denied by Judge Sherrill D.Luke of the Los Angeles Judicial District Court. On March 13, 1987 the writ requesting all judicial proceedings with the Appellate Division of the Los Angeles Superior Court was denied. At the subsequent arraignment all five defendants including Jello Biafra entered pleas of not-quilty. On July 1 a trial date was set for August 11. During the period of jury selection three related cases were dropped que to insufficient evidence. The case was tried before jury on August 25 in Los Angeles Municipal Court under Judge Susan E, Isacoff. On August 27 the jury indicated a deadlock at 7 for dismissing the case and 5 for convicting the defendants. Michael Guarring, the prosecuting attourney, attempted to petition the court for a rehearing of the case, but Judge Isacoff denied the motion and dismissed the charges.

We can all breathe our sighs of relief, however I wouldn't advise becoming too relaxed. For

Jazz From Hell: Frank Zappa

Frank Zappa's lattest release, Jazz From Hell, is an instrumental album along the lines of his Shut Up and Play Yer Guitar: Trilogy, But primarily focused on electric, progressive, unadultered iazz.

This album, unlike his previous instrumental work, does not contain the xylaphonery of *Tink Walks Amok*, nor the guitar licks reminescent of *Shut Up* ..., but instead examines the versatility and creativity of Zappa's musical talents.

Its not very often that I get a chance to read Maximum Rock n' Roll's Philly scene report, but every time I do, particular bands dominate the article. In fact, the section should be re-titled the Northeast Philly scene report, Its not that these bands shouldn't receive any notice, but it is self-centered not to mention the fact that Philadelphia has other bands and more than one style of music.

Is it due to lack of information

on local acts that there is usually such a dismal turnout for local shows. I would hate to think that all you kids out there were so obtuse that you would not go check out a local act simply because you had not heard them before. Hence, I shall try to list a selection of unwaxed bands, what they do, and perhaps a bit of editorial. These are far from the only bands in Philly or even the best bands in Philly; they are merely those that came to mind as I sat and typed this edification in are aeuphony.

One of the more noted local bands successfully blends a strict seventies rock sound with the more recent and grungy trend in underground music. Watching Holy Smoke play kind of satiates the desire I have always had to see those bands I grew up with (I did see Led Zeppelin at Live-Aid but it was far from the same thing: Phil Collins on drums was an insult to anything they have ever done). Nonetheless, definate signs of Zeppelin and Floyd-ish melodies permeate guitarist Art DiFuria's style of writing. My only complaint lies in the length of some of their songs: not that all of their songs are too long, its just that a few continue on and on without really accomplishing anything. All in all though, Holy Smoke puts on a pretty rockin' set and if you haven't seen them yet, you should. Another pretty cool diverse sound comes from a brand new band called Blue Train. Although

they have not played out that much

(I have seen them live only once),

they have realeased a demo with 4 tracks that evolved from over four months of practice. Leading the band with most of the writing is Paul Decolater (formerly of Pleased Youth and presently the guiding force of local 'zine Free TNT) and also the band features Dave Bertwell on bass (some of the older readers may remember him from The Blunder Boys or Crib Death). Blue Train puts out a hard-edged rock sound with just enough grunge to keep it raw. Two tracks on the demo also reveal their ability to do a few slower and more melodic tunes, yet still keep enough of an edge to maintain their sound. Really cool rock n' roll, definitely check out.

A little less rougher, but still

a relatively good band is The Balls. The Balls are a basic rock n' roll sounding trio with a poppy edge. Each of the six tracks on their demo tape is a pretty Sraightforward mix of decent guitar and drum work but the overall result provides for some pretty good songs. Their catchy riffs and good use of backing harmonies come to play in the tape's best two tracks Song in F and Braynda a cool melodic tune with R.E.M.-ish guitar. Live, these guys pull off their songs in pretty much the same style, but with a more open dimension, allowing their quitarist to show some skill that might have taken away from the recorded version. Definitely one the better bands in Philly.

"Skewered Americana with psychadelic overtones and grated cheese," is the description that quitarist Dave Ragsdale gives of his band Sky Gritz. In reality. they're a basic rock n' roll band with a light jangley sound that combines some basic pop, country, and even little folk. Their 5-track demo shows a certain diversity that ranges from the lilting Wild Flowers to a satirical metal tune, I Love Lucifer, that rips in spite of itself. Reflecting the band's sound more aptly, however, are two of the remaining tracks Stupid Man

Sons of Ace are a reggae band. Although this description is incredibly brief I see no better depiction, they were neither poor. nor did they prove to be extremely fantastic. If you like reggae you will enjoy this band (as I did the other night as I skanked about for over three hours at a party), but they were nothing especially suprising. Definitely worth it if you want catch some cool rasta beats and have a lot of fun.

Another Carribean influenced band is Doctor at Tree. A heavy percussion section is the backbone of their sound and simplistic lyrics complete their lively set. A staight-forward approach to their stiye (no pretensions and no self-gratification) makes Doctor At Tree different and enjoyable, A lot of fun to see but can become a bit redundant at times.

Although this list is far from inclusive or even complete in its description, it is an introduction to a few local Philly bands that do not receive a great deal of exposure. So, just because you have not heard a bands music or seen one of their shows is no exuse not to check them out (you never know, it might be just what your looking for). Most of the above bands have demo tapes you can call us here at WKDU and request to hear or you can just wait until a band plays out and go check them out. Which ever way, you will be better for it and Just As Well . Each use catchy guitar riffs; but, Stupid Man is slightly more jazzy than Just As Well, which tends to be straightforward, creating a candid and overall fun sound. This sound is carried over in their live set which

is highlighted by Ragsdale's own

little antics which include, at least

the last time I saw them at Antic

City: convulsions, coma, and death.

WKDU: How is you're relationship with Sire? Do they treat you well?

PAUL & CHRIS: Sire been belly. belly good to us.

PAUL: They're all right. If we sold more records they would pay more attention to us, but I can't complain. They tolerate us...they allow us to fuck up and do what we want. They'd prefer for us to be more like The Cult for instance, or very, very serious about what we do. We're not a serious bunch of guys, which makes it more difficult. but we're talented and stuff, so they don't quite know how to handle us.

WKDU: Who do you think is the biggest threat to music today?

PAUL: Bands that like to make a lot of money but have no soul. The bands are the problem, not the managers and all the people that run the music business. they're the obvious target. The bands that will sell themselves out first, and allow themselves to be manipulated are the problem. If every band was like us, what would they do? Everything you'd hear on the radio would be Hüsker Dü. Soul Asylum and the Replacements. No, its the bands that go "Oh God, we can make a million dollars in two weeks. lets do it!" They're the problem.

WKDU: If the band were to break up after this tour, what different directions do you think you'd go?

PAUL: I'd go east.

CHRIS: I'd become a curb washer.

SLIM: I'd go to hell.

### ...the replacements

About 18 months ago I wrote an article for this very publication in which I referred to the Replacements (singer/songwriter/guitarist Paul Westerberg; bass player Tommy Stinson; drummer Chris Mars; and at that time, lead guitarist Bob Stinson) as "the greatest band you've never heard of." Well, as of this summer, that particular moniker no longer holds water. Minneapolis' own thrash kings are, how do I say it? Well, they're HOT! They're happening. Its suddenly very cool to be a 'Mats fan. God help us all.

The release of their latest LP "Pleased to Meet Me" took them into the Top 50 and onto the pages of such mainstream publications as Rolling Stone, Spin, and Musician.

I had the opportunity to talk to Westerberg, Mars and new guitaris Slim Dunlop on the day of their sold-out show at the Chestnut Cabaret in July.

WKDU: So, how do you feel about the new LP?

PAUL: Well, its our latest. Its also my favorite. I don't exactly know why, but guess it sounds better to my ears than the other ones. The other albums have things on them that are "precious"...sq its hard to explain. We were listening to the radio today and you were playing the old stuff from eight years ago and its kind of funny to hear that, beacuse to doesn't sound like me singing or the way we were playing back then.

WKDU: How do you feel when you hear those songs.

PAUL: Partially its embarassing and partially its a thrill. It means you're still together. We haven't gotten any better, but we're still together.

WKDU: Do you listen to your old stuff when you're out on the road?

PAUL: No. On the radio, that's what makes is exciting.

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CHRIS: We were hearing the stuff today and we were talking about how last it was.

PAUL: I haven't listened to "Color Me impressed" in years. I was learning the words all over again, I didn't know them. I hadn't heard it for three or four years...we've been doing it for three or four years, but I've just been getting up there and singing it.

KDU: How has the addition of a new member worked out on your first tour with him?

PAUL: I'd like to fire him as soon as possible. I miss having a fat guy that can't play.

SLIM: Versus a skinny one that can't. PAUL: No, we don't miss Bob. We all like Bob personally, it just got to the point where he didn't fit the band and Slim's personality is such that we get along better with him than we had been with Bob in the last few years.

SLIM: I have no personality.

WKDU: There's a line in the song "Alex Chilton" that goes 'falling asleep with a pop pop video on...' Are you still as opposed to video as you have been in the past?

PAUL: No, we have six of them coming out in a row.

WKDU: I still haven't seen the video for "The Ledge."

PAUL: They won't play it. They just don't like it. We may try the other route. They're not playing the ones that are above their heads, so we're thinking about getting the whole Bon Jovi thing, wear wigs and all.

WKDU: Do you feel that your signing to Sire Records is the middle ground between what you believe in and what you're willing to sacrifice? Do you feel you've compromised in any way?

PAUL: At this point I don't think so. We're at the point now where PLEASED TO MEET ME if it was on Twin/Tone would sound the way it sounds. We want to make the best sounding record we can. We can still horse around, and do anything we want, but we've done everything we've wanted in terms of making noise, screwing around, playing covers, leaving in wrong notes, letting it feed back... If we continued to do that, who else are we going to get to like us.

Other material presented, be it a tune from the Flapper era of the 1920's, an obscure wonder from the 70's, a childrens record or a gospel tune, helps to round out the mindwarp and 'Wonderful Things for Beautiful People' Theme.

Another feature of the World of OZ is the 'OZ Mix' concept; the audible montage of music for a specific theme or freakout. These OZ Mixes blend in wonderously with the ideas of discovery and awareness through a wash of perceptual voluptuousness.



"Much of what these young people found was revolutionary and provoking. At first inspired by the powerful protest of British youth to the Thatcherite oppression, the radio stations soon found reasons enough to lead the fight here, with both consumerist and religious fanaticism waxing back on "the good oi' days", where everyone was healthy and happy and ignorant. "The Age of the Scam", it was called, with everyone looking out for themselves, selling each other out and rationalizing every single action they took.

"It was in this atmosphere that a few people sought out to be different. They revelled in the

music to be found on the small stations, and they came together to listen and make their own music. This happened time and time again in virtually every city throughout the country. When the underground evolved, it was natural that many came from these very same radio stations.

"The corporations, who had believed they could hold everyone in their consumerist sway, at first considered the stations an insignificant aberration. But when they began to realize the tremendous impact that the stations actually had, it was altogether too late. Other factions of the underground had taken up the fight: the computer hackers were one of these, and they proved to be the most powerful."


